Spotlight

Inclusion Symposium

From March 19–20, 2024, in collaboration with From Presence to Citizenship, Community Living Ontario hosted an Inclusion Symposium. This event marked a significant milestone for the DS sector, being the first of its kind to dedicate an entire day to diversity, equity, and inclusion (DEI). The symposium was exceptionally well-received and offered a comprehensive platform for networking, information sharing, and capacity building.

The Inclusion Symposium not only highlighted the importance of DEI, but also reinforced our commitment to fostering an inclusive and equitable sector. The event served as a catalyst for ongoing DEI initiatives and inspired participants to integrate these principles into their daily operations.

Spotlight

Family-Led Initiative Grants

In 2023, we launched our Family-Led Initiatives grant program. This grant funding aims to support family-led engagement groups in our communities for family members of loved ones who have an intellectual disability. We believe that fostering strong family connections and collaboration is vital for the holistic development of all people.

We received a total of 56 proposals, 15 of which we funded. Through these grants, we reached 1,000+ people. By providing financial assistance of up to \$10,000, we helped enable these groups and networks to design and implement innovative and impactful family engagement at the grassroots level in Ontario.

Our Work

Advocacy, Education and Awareness

Community Living Ontario develops policy solutions and advocates for changes that increase the community participation, inclusion and belonging of people who have an intellectual disability. We work alongside people who have intellectual disabilities, their families, local associations, and governments to shape public policy that is practical and progressive. We bring a collective voice to the developmental services sector and advocate for the full and authentic inclusion of people who have intellectual disabilities in all communities.

KEY ACHIEVEMENTS:

The Right to Decide

People's right to make decisions and have control over their own lives is critical to health and well-being. The failure to ensure this right is one of our province's most pressing issues. This year, we continued Community Living Ontario's longstanding and groundbreaking work on legal capacity and supported decision-making. Building on the innovative and forward-thinking efforts of leaders like Orville Endicott, Audrey Cole, Michael Bach, and others, we published The Right to Decide, a series of documents that envisions a legal framework that recognizes and supports control and decision-making among people labelled with intellectual disability.

Privatization of Developmental Services in Ontario — What's Ahead?

Our May 2023 webinar about the history of privatization in long term care and the private interests already involved in developmental services attracted over 900 registrants and nearly 550 participants, making it our most popular webinar to date. The webinar featured panelists Dr. Pat Armstrong and Megan Linton.

Red Tape, Human Rights, and Registered Disability Savings Plans in Ontario — Part 1

Many people with intellectual disabilities in Ontario are beneficiaries of Registered Disability Savings Plans, where a family member is the RDSP 'plan holder' – in other words, they are responsible for managing the RDSP with the beneficiary. We are now seeing situations where plan holders have died or become unable to manage the RDSP – leaving beneficiaries without a plan holder. This raises serious risks for people, including the risk of falling into guardianship. In this policy brief, CLO presents a straightforward solution to this problem – a solution that protects people's financial health while respecting their rights.

Red Tape, Human Rights, and Registered Disability Savings Plans in Ontario — Part 2

As part of our advocacy to improve Registered Disability Savings Plans, Community Living Ontario released a document that shares the stories of four families facing unnecessary RDSP-related barriers. These families are increasingly frustrated by problems with RDSPs that threaten the financial health of people with intellectual disabilities and increase their risk of coming under guardianship of the Public Guardian and Trustee.

Community Relations and Collaborations:

Community Living Ontario works closely alongside its member organizations to support their advocacy, provide resources, and create opportunities for collaboration.

KEY ACHIEVEMENTS:

- Welcomed three new members: Willowbridge, Surrey Place, Madawaska Valley Association for Community Living.
- From June 8-10, 2023, Community Living Ontario's Council, Board and Management team visited beautiful Timmins, Ontario for a series of engagements with families, self-advocates, organizational leaders, and staff. The two-and-a-half-day event combined networking opportunities with educational forums and presentations as well as CLO Council and Board meetings.
- Mobilized members around #5ToSurvive campaign (See page 16 for more details).
- Ocollaborated with Community Living Toronto to organize Day at the Legislature (See <u>page 8</u> for more details).
- After a brief hiatus, restarted our Communications Network meetings to share and exchange knowledge about communications practices with member association staff.

Family Engagement

Recognizing the essential role families played in sparking the Community Living movement, CLO continues to create opportunities for them to connect. Family Engagement offers a variety of ways regionally and provincially to empower families to build a better future for their loved ones.

KEY ACHIEVEMENTS:

> Family-Led Initiative Grants

◆ Amazing Families, Telling Our Stories — Putting into Words the Matters of Our Heart

In 2023, CLO ran two family leadership series in the Brockville and Hamilton regions. Over three weekends, the Brockville series catered to 16 families and the Hamilton series catered to 11 families. Both series reached out to more than 100 people. Participating families engaged in sessions facilitated by CLO's Family Steering Committee members and guest speakers with the support of CLO staff.

Youth Engagement

Community Living Ontario's
Re:Action4Inclusion initiative aims to
empower youth to take action individually
and collectively to make our schools
and communities more inclusive spaces.
Led by a Youth Advisory Committee,
this movement seeks to change the
Canadian narrative of disability and to help
communities embrace young adults as
community leaders and collaborators. We
support youth to facilitate conversations
that will reframe the current understanding
of "community" and that will help us build
neighbourhoods where all youth can thrive.

KEY ACHIEVEMENTS:

DISRUPT! Workshops

DISRUPT! was a series of educational workshops developed by Community Living Ontario's Youth Advisory Committee as part of an education grant. The purpose of DISRUPT! was to provide youth, educators, allies, and self-advocates with social justice education and raise awareness about issues that matter to Canadian youth. These workshops allowed participants to come together to share ideas and learn ways to create a more inclusive Canada. We hosted a total of 30 workshops that engaged over 1,000 youth and adult allies.

Imagination in Motion

Beginning in February 2024, the Youth Advisory Committee initiated a new <u>Instagram series</u> entitled "Imagination in Motion." Each month, the youth advisors use various artistic means — videos, poems, illustrations, etc. — to raise awareness about issues and advocacy topics that are relevant to youth today.

Student Links Mentoring

Funded by the Ministry of Children,
Community and Social Services, Student
Links is an opportunity for students (ages
14 to 21) who have an intellectual disability
to explore ideas for their future after high
school. It matches students and mentors
who share a common passion or interest.
The goal is to enhance their capacity to
make informed decisions about their future
prior to leaving school and to support
the natural development of valued roles,
relationships, and connections to their
community.

KEY ACHIEVEMENTS:

- Granted approval to work in partnership with Ottawa Catholic School Board schools in the 2024-2025 academic year.
- Onducted French interview with CBC Radio Canada.
- Occomposition Collaborated with Partners4Planning to create a video series capturing students' stories and a range of experiences. Watch the first video in the series here and the second video here.
- Promotional efforts for Student Links have included Pattison digital billboards across Ontario, Bell Media <u>radio ads</u> in Sudbury, 64 CLO social media posts, and a new landing page: <u>StudentLinks.org</u>.
- Provided services in multiple languages: English, French, Cantonese, Mandarin, Punjabi, Urdu, Hindi, Arabic, Chaozhou dialect, Spanish, Polish.

Our Work

- Relaunched the bilingual region, Sudbury, with the intention to connect with more families in the north and to increase service to Francophone students and families.
- Onboarded five new coordinators and began the interview process to relaunch Kitchener/ Waterloo/Guelph as a region.
- Ontinued to collaborate and present with Youth Initiatives to amplify the voices of youth with and without a disability.
- > Hybrid model of engagement continues to have the following positive outcomes:
- → Fewer cancellations
- → Virtual meetings are a good option when travel is unsafe (e.g., in winter)
- → Provides access to a larger pool of experts when students are in remote regions
- → Allows participation of students with anxiety and/or mental health challenges who would not engage if in-person engagement was the only option

Diversity, Equity and Inclusion

As Community Living Ontario continues to work towards creating inclusive communities across Ontario, we aim to be more purposeful about increasing our understanding of all people and improving our approach to inclusion. There is more work to be done, but with our continued efforts at advancing Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion, we will get there.

KEY ACHIEVEMENTS:

Inclusion Symposium

From March 19–20, 2024, in collaboration with From Presence to Citizenship, Community Living Ontario hosted an Inclusion Symposium. This event marked a significant milestone for the developmental services (DS) sector, being the first of its kind to dedicate an entire day to diversity, equity, and inclusion. See page 9 for more details.

Equity, Diversity and Inclusion Community of Practice

CLO has taken a leadership role in enhancing organizational capacity by chairing the Equity, Diversity and Inclusion Community of Practice (EDI CoP) for the DS sector. The EDI CoP has collaborated with Central Region's Anti-Racism Committee and the RealXchange knowledge hub to develop valuable resources aimed at improving EDI practices within the DS sector. Using funding provided by CLO, we hosted three webinars targeting the DS sector at large. Additionally, we organized a specialized learning session for EDI CoP members titled "The DEI Advantage: Creating Impactful Change in Governance and Operations." This session provided insights into effective governance and operational strategies that promote diversity, equity, and inclusion.

EDI Resources Repository

The Equity, Diversity and Inclusion (EDI) Community of Practice for the Developmental services sector (chaired by CLO's Diversity, Equity and Inclusion Officer, Alison Mclean) collaborated with Central Region's Antiracism Committee and the RealXchange to develop and launch an EDI resources repository for the DS sector. This repository was launched on June 26th, 2023 and serves as a continually updated hub for sharing tools, guides, and best practices related to diversity, equity, and inclusion from other agencies across the sector.

Employment

Ready, Willing & Able (RWA) is a national partnership of Inclusion Canada, Autism Alliance of Canada, and their member organizations. Funded by the Government of Canada, RWA is designed to increase the labour force participation of autistic people and people who have an intellectual disability. Community Living Ontario hosts four Labour Market Facilitators: one in Ottawa, one in Hamilton-Niagara, and two in Toronto. We could not do this work without our amazing community partners, which include CLO members as well as a broad range of organizations in the employment services sector.

KEY ACHIEVEMENTS:

- Across Canada, the Ready, Willing & Able program has facilitated 4,603 employment outcomes among jobseekers who have a developmental disability since 2014.
- In 2023-2024, CLO Labour Market Facilitators:
- → Engaged with 738 employers who were open to hiring inclusively.
- → Shared 497 jobs with prospective job seekers.
- → Facilitated the successful hiring of 133 people and supported 17 people to pursue post-secondary studies.

Council

The Council of Community Living Ontario consists of 12 self-advocates from across the province who work together with Community Living Ontario's Board of Directors to find solutions and share information, opinions, knowledge, and experience on important issues such as poverty, safe and affordable housing, human rights, and barriers to quality health care.

KEY ACHIEVEMENTS:

- Ocnducted an in-person presentation to 100+ attendees in Timmins on June 9, 2023, which introduced the Council and their advocacy work.
- Made an in-person presentation to Minister of Children, Community and Social Services Michael Parsa and his staff during CLO's Day at the Legislature.
- Nosted webinars in collaboration with member agencies (Community Living Guelph Wellington, Community Living Toronto) on the topic of "Aging in Place and Ensuring People Stay Out of Institutions." These webinars collectively reached more than 700 people in the province of Ontario.
- *Aging in Place" Council Presentation at Fanshawe College: On Thursday, March 21, 2024, members of Council delivered an inspiring presentation called "Aging in Place" to 35 nursing gerontology program post-graduate students at Fanshawe College in London, Ontario. The presenters were Judy Noonan (Vice President),

Robert Smith (Secretary), Niko Pupella (Treasurer), and James Taylor (Council-Appointed Board Director-at-Large). The goal of the presentation was to educate future nursing students about the importance of allowing people to make choices about where and how they live. The presenters also highlighted the negative impact of labels when caring for and supporting people.

Community Living Ontario Development

2023–2024 was a successful year for CLO's ever-evolving fundraising and development strategies. Our valued strategic partners continue to support our work and offer their services and products to our growing membership, while we in turn continue to expand and innovate new ways to involve our partners. We also actively raised funds through initiatives including holiday and spring appeal campaigns, conference sponsorships, grants and major donors, and events including CL Day at the Argos and the TCS Waterfront Marathon Charity Challenge.

In 2023, CLO also introduced our firstever Community Ambassador: Canadian media star Ali Hassan! Ali is a CBC radio and TV personality, comedian, actor, author, professional chef, professor, and father of four — but he has also been a longtime advocate for the Community Living movement and an outspoken fundraiser for our initiatives. We are thrilled to have Ali Hassan helping us spread the word about our movement.

CAMPAIGN SPOTLIGHT:

#5TOSURVIVE

In October 2023, in partnership with Community Living Toronto and OASIS, we launched our #5ToSurvive advocacy campaign in response to tremendous financial pressures being faced by our members, who had not seen a significant increase to their base funding in 30 years. The campaign called on the Ontario government to provide an immediate 5% boost to developmental services agency core funding, as well as Passport and Special Services at Home.

#5ToSurvive generated an incredible amount of attention and united our sector around a common goal. Through email petitions, social media, traditional media coverage, a 2024 prebudget submission, and more, we put pressure on the government to fulfill its duty to the developmental services sector and provide our members with the resources they need to continue their essential work. The campaign was covered nearly 50 times by media outlets speaking to CLO and our member organizations, while our email petition alone generated over 11.000 signatures and reached more than 125 Members of Provincial Parliament, Our efforts were rewarded with a 3% increase to developmental services in Ontario — a major victory when the sector was bracing for the likelihood of no increase at all.

We would like to take this opportunity to thank everyone who made this campaign possible and supported it — we could not have done it alone and are so proud of what we were able to accomplish collectively.




